From the Pastor's Desk



I remember going through RCIA, now known as OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation for Adults), and being in awe of the richness of our faith and the encouragement I received from my parish community. It has been 16 years since I received my sacraments, and yet I remember it as if it were just yesterday! During these months of preparation, we, as a family of parishes, have the opportunity to accompany these men and women on their journey of faith and discovery. It is an exciting season for our parishes – a time for us to share the beauty and richness of our faith and to welcome our new members into our community. Our OCIA classes begin this Wednesday, and will conclude

with the Easter Vigil, when our candidates and catechumens will be fully initiated into the Catholic Church. I invite you to join me in praying for them, and for our OCIA team, during this time. Send your Holy Spirit upon our candidates, catechumens, and catechists to be their helper and guide. Give them the spirit of wisdom and understanding. the spirit of right judgment and courage, the spirit of knowledge and reverence. Fill them with the spirit of wonder and awe in your presence, that filled with the gifts of your Spirit, they may join us in time at the table of the Eucharist. We ask this through Christ, Our Lord.

Notes From Fr. Adam Lewis



Brothers & Sisters, it often happens that I do not include all the material from my notes in Sunday's homily for the sake of brevity. I want to include some of last Sunday's notes here for your edification (22nd Sunday in OT):

Four characteristics of pride and humility:

Defensiveness vs. Contrition, Criticism vs. Gratitude, Stonewalling vs. Bonding, Contempt vs. Charity. (From the podcast: OptimalWork, *Professional Humility I-VI* and *Why Marriages Succeed or Fail: What You Can Learn from the*

Breakthrough Research to Make Your Marriage Last, by John M. Gottman) St. Benedict outlines the twelve steps of humility in Chapter 7 of his Rule, emphasizing that humility is essential for spiritual growth and the attainment of divine grace. Here's a summary of each step:

- 1. Fear of God: Always keep the fear of God before your eyes, remembering His commandments and the consequences of sin.
- 2. Self-Will: Do not be wedded to your own will; instead, seek to fulfill God's will in all things.
- 3. Obedience: Submit to the authority of your superiors and obey their commands as if they were God's.
- 4. Silence: Speak only when necessary and avoid excessive talk, which can lead to pride and distraction.
- 5. Humility in Action: Perform your duties with a humble heart, recognizing that all actions are seen by God.
- 6. Avoiding Pride: Recognize that pride leads to downfall; strive to remain humble in all circumstances.
- 7. Simplicity: Embrace simplicity in your life, avoiding the complexities that can lead to pride and distraction.
- 8. Self-Examination: Regularly examine your thoughts and actions, ensuring they align with humility and virtue.
- 9. Community Life: Live in harmony with others, valuing their contributions and maintaining a spirit of cooperation.
- 10. Acceptance of Correction: Accept correction and guidance from others with a humble heart, recognizing it as a path to growth.
- 11. Perseverance in Humility: Remain steadfast in your commitment to humility, even in the face of challenges and temptations.
- 12. Physical Manifestation of Humility: Show humility in your physical demeanor, such as bowing your head and keeping your eyes downcast, reflecting your inner state.

https://catholicaoc.org/ beacons-of-light Pope Leo XIV today urged altar servers to deepen their friendship with Jesus Christ, to "engrave" on their hearts that He is the only Savior of the world, and to remember that His sacrifice on the Cross, renewed on the altar during every Holy Mass, is "the most marvelous reality of our Catholic faith." "The celebration of the Mass saves the world today," he said, exhorting them to keep always in mind the grandeur and holiness of what is being celebrated, and to reflect it by their silence and demeanor. Addressing the Altar Servers, in the Clementine Hall of the Apostolic Palace, the Holy Father also invited them to be open to the Lord's call.



In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Peace be with you!

Dear Altar Servers, who have come, good morning!

I welcome you to Rome, and I am very happy to meet you, together with all those accompanying you: laypeople, priests, and bishops, whom I greet warmly.

You know that this year is a special one: it is a *Holy Year*—which takes place only every 25 years—during which the Lord Jesus offers us an exceptional opportunity. By coming to Rome and passing through the Holy Door, He helps us to "convert," that is, to turn towards Him, to grow in faith and in His love, so as to become better disciples, that our life may be good and beautiful in His sight, in view of eternal life. It is therefore a great gift from Heaven that you are here this year! I invite you to embrace it by living with intensity the activities that are offered to you, but above all by taking the time to speak with Jesus in the secret of your heart and to love Him more and more. His one desire is to be part of your life, to illumine it from within, to become your truest and most faithful friend. Life becomes beautiful and joyful with Jesus. But He awaits your response. He knocks at the door and waits to enter: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock; if anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with me" (Rev 3:20). To be "with" Jesus, the very Son of God, to enter into His friendship!—what an unimaginable destiny! What happiness! What consolation! What hope for the future!

Hope, in fact, is the theme of this Holy Year. Perhaps you sense how greatly we need to hope. You certainly hear that the world is in distress, faced with ever more serious and troubling challenges. It may be that you yourselves, or those close to you, are touched by suffering, illness or disability, failure, the loss of a loved one; and, in the face of such trials, your heart is burdened with sadness and anguish. Who will come to our aid? Who will have mercy on us? Who will come to save us—not only from our sorrows, our limitations, and our faults, but even from death itself?

The answer is perfectly clear and has resounded throughout history for two thousand years: Jesus alone comes to save us, and no one else—for He alone has the power, since He is God almighty Himself, and because He loves us. Saint Peter declared it with force: "There is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Never forget this word, dear friends; engrave it upon your heart; and place Jesus at the center of your life. I hope you will return from Rome closer to Him, more determined than ever to love and follow Him, and thus better equipped with hope for the journey that lies before you. This hope will always be present in moments of difficulty, doubt, discouragement, and storm, like a solid anchor cast towards Heaven (cf. Heb 6:19), which will enable you to continue along the way.

There is one sure proof that Jesus loves us and saves us: He gave His life for us by offering it on the Cross. Indeed, there is no greater love than to lay down one's life for those one loves (cf. Jn 15:13). And

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here lies the most marvelous reality of our Catholic faith, something no one could ever have imagined or even hoped for: God, the Creator of heaven and earth, chose to suffer and to die for us, His creatures. God loved us unto death! To bring this about, He came down from Heaven, He humbled Himself by becoming man, and He offered Himself on the Cross as a sacrifice—the most important event in the history of the world. What have we to fear from such a God who has loved us to this extent? What more could we possibly hope for? What are we waiting for to love Him in return as He deserves? Gloriously risen, Jesus lives at the Father's side; He now cares for us and communicates to us His imperishable life.

And the Church, from generation to generation, carefully keeps alive the memory of the Lord's death and resurrection, of which she is the witness, as her most precious treasure. She preserves it and hands it on by celebrating the Eucharist, which you have the joy and the honor of serving. The **Eucharist is the Treasure of the Church, the Treasure of Treasures**. From the very first day of her existence, and then throughout the centuries, the Church has celebrated the Mass, Sunday after Sunday, to remember what her Lord has done for her. In the hands of the priest, and at his words, "This is my Body, this is my Blood," Jesus still gives His life upon the Altar; He still pours out His Blood for us today. **Dear Altar Servers, the celebration of the Mass saves us today! It saves the world today! It is the most important event in the life of the Christian and in the life of the Church, for it is the encounter where God gives Himself to us in love, again and again. The Christian does not go to Mass out of duty, but because he needs it—absolutely!—the need for the life of God, which is given without reserve!**

Dear friends, I thank you for your commitment: it is a very great and generous service that you render to your parish, and I encourage you to persevere faithfully. When you draw near to the Altar, always keep in mind the greatness and the holiness of what is being celebrated. The Mass is a moment of festivity and of joy. Indeed, how could the heart not rejoice in the presence of Jesus? And yet, the Mass is at the same time a solemn, serious moment, imbued with gravitas. May your demeanor, your silence, the dignity of your service, the beauty of the liturgy, the order and majesty of the gestures, draw the faithful into the sacred grandeur of the Mystery.

I also express the wish that you remain attentive to the call that Jesus might address to you, **inviting you to follow Him more closely in the priesthood**. I appeal to your consciences as youngsters, enthusiastic and generous, and I will tell you something that you must hear, even if it may trouble you somewhat: the shortage of priests in France, and in the world, is a great misfortune! A misfortune for the Church. May you gradually, Sunday after Sunday, come to discover the beauty, the joy, and the necessity of such a vocation. How wonderful is the life of a priest, who, at the heart of each of his days, encounters Jesus in so extraordinary a way and gives Him to the world!

Dear Altar Servers, I thank you once more for your visit. Your number, and the faith that animates you, are a great consolation, a sign of hope. Persevere courageously, and bear witness around you to the pride and joy that come from serving at Mass.

From my heart I bestow upon you, and upon your companions, your priests, and your families, the Apostolic Blessing.



THE CATHOLIC COMPANY PRESENTS: GET FED - BITE-SIZED FAITH

Who were the Catholic heroes of revolutionary France?

Meet the rebels of the Vendée—a group who gave everything for God and country. "I often fought, sometimes I was beaten, but I have never been killed off."

— General François-Athanase de Charette, leader of the Vendée revolt

Amidst the bloody horror of the French Revolution, stories of heroism miraculously arose. One of the most famous is the tragic but glorious tale of the rebels of the Vendée – a region in western France that was devoutly Catholic and resisted the vicious attacks on the Church enacted by the revolutionary government. The Vendéans weren't initially against all the Revolution's aims, but things got ugly when the Civil Constitution of the Clergy was passed in the summer of 1790. This decree abolished over a third of dioceses and a quarter of the parishes in France. Clergy were exiled, interned, and killed for refusing to swear a required oath of loyalty to the state. The decimation of the Catholic religion was clearly underway, and the Vendéans would not stand for it. The tipping point came when the government introduced conscription. The Vendéans had no interest in fighting for the Republic, and they instead organized themselves into the Catholic and Royal Army. It was composed mostly of peasants, in the name of whom the Revolution – ironically – claimed to act. The Sacred Heart patch worn by the Vendéan rebels. It reads, "God, the King."

Members of the Catholic nobility joined later, bringing much-needed military expertise with them. Some of the revolt's most famous leaders were these young aristocrats – men mostly in their 20s and 30s – who would lay down their lives on the battlefield or by execution. The Catholic and Royal Army had some success initially, taking several towns and the city of Angers by midsummer 1793. But in autumn, the Revolutionary Army had reinforced and reorganized themselves to deadly effect. They crushed the rebels at the Battle of Le Mans, and engaged in dreadful slaughter of prisoners afterwards. The terror had only just begun. In November, a law came into effect that delineated a plan to exterminate the Vendéans—including women, children, and the elderly. The groundwork for the plan had been laid even earlier,

in the spring of that year. At the end of November, the inhuman General Louis Marie Turreau took command of the Republican army and formed "infernal columns" that marched through the Vendée, burning villages and slaughtering the inhabitants. Though the rebels were effectively defeated at the Battle of Savenay on December 21, 1793, the terror against civilians lasted from August 1793 through July 1794, a campaign that has been accurately called genocide. With the recall of Turreau and the rise of a more moderate faction in the government, an amnesty was reached at the end of 1794. Early the next year, the rebels were granted freedom of worship and exemption from conscription. When Napoleon – a great admirer of the Vendéans – came to power, he further granted compensation and assistance to the devastated region.

The Republic tried to bury the history of this rebellion, and for a long time the official narrative excluded much mention of it. Even up until the 20th century, the story was not fully known. A French historian, Reynald Secher – whose ancestors died in the Vendée – decided to change that. Beginning in the 1970s and continuing for decades, his monumentally important research shed new light on this period of history. The Vendéan rebels—like St. John Paul II—remind us to "be not afraid" in our own day.



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
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
